SJPD is a popular recruiting hub for talented law enforcement personnel. Our Department standards are set high to attract motivated men and women who want to invest their calling to serve in our community.

SJPD conducts comprehensive testing and interview programs every two years to ensure that top candidates are next in line if a position becomes available.

There are two lists posted after approval by the St. John Board of Safety. The first is the New Police Officer Eligibility List for candidates who may or may not have experience in law enforcement. These candidates are typically sent to the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy if a position is offered and accepted.

The second is the Emergency Hire List. This list encompasses experienced, sworn officers waiting to join our team when an emergency hiring is necessary to fill a vacant position.









5-Year Graph Comparison










Indiana town won't let memory of murders die



At St. John, Ind., State Policeman John J. Streau, 25, and Marshal James Larimer, 55, were shot to death while attempting to question two men in a stolen car. State Trooper Pete Popplewell Jr., 29, was wounded by one of the suspects, who then threw down his empty gun and begged for mercy as Popplewell held him in his sights.

Police Flags Lowered To Mourn Slain Lawmen

ST. JOHN — Flags flew at half-staff here and at State Police posts throughout Indiana today as preparations were made to bury two lawmen killed in a shootout.

Police at the Schererville post, meanwhile, declined further statements on the shooting Saturday for fear of prejudicing their prosecution of the two suspects.

St. John Town Marshal James Larimer, 55, and Trooper John J. Streu, 25, were killed early Saturday behind Kolling Elementary School as they investigated a suspicious looking car.

Flags at State Police Posts were lowered at 10 a.m. Saturday in honor of Streu.

Streu, a State Police rookie since August and a former Cass County sheriff for three years, will be buried Tuesday in Logansport, Ind., his home and that of his parents.

Larimer, a former Hammond policeman, was honored here with a request by town officials that all flags be lowered for 30 days.

Larimer will be buried in Chapel Lawn Memorial Gardens, Schererville, following services from the Burns Funeral Home, 8415 Calumet Ave., Munster.

A third lawman injured in the shootout, Trooper Pete Popplewell, 29, is in satisfactory condition in Mercy Hospital today. He is expected to be released about mid-week barring complications
