Improvements

- Assigned a veteran officer to traffic safety concerns and requests.
- Added a second K9 Unit to advance our efforts in keeping suspects in their place.
- Immobilized a License Plate Reader (LPR) Camera to our inventory. U.S. 41 happens to be a main drug trafficking route, and a fast escape into other communities.
- Added a drone and thermal imaging to our search and rescue efforts. This equipment assists with reconstruction of incident scenes, apprehending runaway suspects, and locating missing persons.
- Replaced Tasers, portable radios, and mobile laptops.
- Increased patrols in heavy traffic areas, and school drop-offs and dismissals.
- Applied for a matching grant to purchase body cameras that will be implemented during 2022 to 2024.
- Added 3 squads to recycle our aging fleet.
- Participated in the regional Saturation Patrol that stops violators in their tracks throughout Northwest Indiana.

"I didn't know if she was breathing. I just wanted to get her out of the water and into the medic's hands," Shaffer said. "(The children) did nothing wrong. They were in a bad situation that they shouldn't have ever been put in."

On December 12, 2021 at 11:19 p.m., the Lake County Sheriff's Department requested assistance with a traffic stop at 101st and White Oak Avenues in St. John. Officers Shaffer and Sidenbender responded to the call. Units were advised that the vehicle had fled the scene. Upon arrival, Officer Shaffer observed the suspect vehicle traveling west on 109th Avenue. He exercised good judgment by holding off on a traffic stop until Officer

Sidenbender was close enough to back him up. As Officer Sidenbender closed on Officer Shaffer near Greystone and Calumet Avenue, he was advised to proceed with stopping the vehicle. The vehicle then ran a red traffic light and continued west on 101st Avenue. St. John and Lake County units pursued the vehicle into Illinois where the chase then turned north onto IL-394. Officer Shaffer continued the pursuit no further north than I-80/94, and eventually back into Indiana. The suspect lost control of the vehicle and drove straight into a drainage pond near the off-ramp for northbound Kennedy Avenue. Shaffer exited his vehicle and immediately entered the frigid water at great personal risk to himself. While Lake County units held the driver at gunpoint, Officer Shaffer effected a rescue of the two children, one of which was already underwater, inside the vehicle. The care of the children was transferred to EMS personnel, and the driver was taken into custody. Had Officer Shaffer not entered the water when he did,



the children could have drowned. Officer Shaffer shall be recognized for his bravery and sound judgment, which lead to the arrest of the fleeing driver and the lives of two young, innocent children being saved.



Schools



The St. John Police Department works with the Lake Central School Corporation to implement an environment of safe learning for our students and faculty. Corporal Moffitt is assigned to Lake Central High School with a team of officers from Dyer and Schererville Police Departments. Officer Stamate is assigned to Hal E. Clark Middle School.

During the school year, various officers are assigned to monitor traffic during student drop off and pick up. This routine includes Kolling Elementary School and our private schools in town. St. John Police Department is also committed to reducing Stop Arm Violations while buses are transporting students.

"I quickly started running towards the academic C wing. I heard dispatch advise that the 911 call was coming from the third floor C306 bathroom." SRO Corporal Moffitt, first on scene.



On September 8, 2021, St. John Police was dispatched to a report of an active shooter at Lake Central High School. Without hesitation, units quickly responded on the scene. All responding personnel, both on duty and off duty, acted in the highest regard for the safety and welfare of students and staff

without any consideration to personal peril. Our Department personnel, whether sworn or civilian, acted in a calm and professional manner throughout the incident.



All tasks were handled to a level second to none regardless of duty assignment. From the initial report of the alleged shooter, the arrival of officers, the extensive building search, scene control, student dismissal and special needs care, media and parent contacts, the deluge of phone calls and messages, and any other task, all were handled professionally and without complaint. Our response team, on scene or at the Police Department, communicated well and contributed to minimize an extremely dangerous

situation for a successful outcome. The level of commitment and capability shown by all is an outstanding reflection of our Department and the pride all

members should feel for a job well done.



Drone Technology





The St. John Police Department implemented technology and vehicle drone crash reconstructionist techniques in 2021. Five officers have been licensed with the Federal Aviation Administration to operate unmanned small aircraft, better known as drones. One of our officers also received in-depth training from the Indiana Association of Certified Accident Investigators. These officers trained in the use of special software that enables them to reconstruct vehicle crash scenes by taking aerial measurements. The investigation task is performed more efficiently and without the need of additional officers. Roadways can be cleared and opened sooner as well.

Our drone fleet is also equipped with infrared technology to assist with locating missing persons in rough terrain or in areas of limited accessibility. Heat signatures can be located from the air.

Indiana town won't let memory of murders die



At St. John, Ind., State Policeman John J. Streau, 25, and Marshal James Larimer, 55, were shot to death while attempting to question two men in a stolen car. State Trooper Pete Popplewell Jr., 29, was wounded by one of the suspects, who then threw down his empty gun and begged for mercy as Popplewell held him in his sights.

Police Flags Lowered To Mourn Slain Lawmen

ST. JOHN — Flags flew at half-staff here and at State Police posts throughout Indiana today as preparations were made to bury two lawmen killed in a shootout.

Police at the Schererville post, meanwhile, declined further statements on the shooting Saturday for fear of prejudicing their prosecution of the two suspects.

St. John Town Marshal James Larimer, 55, and Trooper John J. Streu, 25, were killed early Saturday behind Kolling Elementary School as they investigated a suspicious looking car.

John R. Lee, 17, of Greensville, Ky. is in fair condition in Our Lady of Mercy hospital, Dyer, under constant police guard.

Lonnie D. Williams, 23, who gave a Hammond address is held in the Lake County Jail.

Streu, a State Police rookie since August and a former Cass County sheriff for three years, will be buried Tuesday in Logansport, Ind., his home and that of his parents.

Larimer will be buried in Chapel Lawn Memorial Gardens, Schererville, following services from the Burns Funeral Home, 8415 Calumet Ave., Munster.

A third lawman injured in the shootout, Trooper Pete Popplewell, 29, is in satisfactory condition in Mercy Hospital today. He is expected to be released about mid-week barring complications
